## Habitat for Humanity Builds Green

## New homes meet highest standards

Making a sustainable home doesn't just mean going green-it means creating homes with lasting value that contribute to the productive growth and positive health of the communities in which we

Portland's Habitat for Humanity has a commitment to green building and continuously looks for ways to make homes affordable to buy and affordable to live in.

In 2007, a unique opportunity arose when the Cascadia Region Building Council challenged participants to design a LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) green rated duplex at 604 N.E. Webster, a property owned by Habitat for Humanity.

The rating system provides a framework for sustainable green building and development practices. LEED certification demonstrates that a building is environmentally responsible and healthy place to live.
