To be in the program, an individual must qualify for an unemployment claim based on wages of less than \$9.24 an hour. In addition, the individual must be attending training designed to prepare him or her for employment in jobs that are in high demand, and where wages are at least

The program does not pay for the training or provide benefits for individuals in training intended to lead to a baccalaureate or higher degree.
