Oregon Schools organize MLK service projects

In 1968 Martin Luther King Jr. proclaimed, "Everybody can be great because everybody can serve." On Monday, Jan. 18, 1,200 students from 11 Oregon colleges and universities will honor Dr. King through a united day of service.

"The vision for the day is to join our institutions together to reflect on and learn about the life of King, as well as show the Portland metro area that college students really care about our community by serving its people," said Warner Pacific College President

Andrea Cook.

The day will begin with a rally hosted by Concordia University in northeast Portland. Students will hear from the local King cite the words of Dr. King.
