A Freedom Rider's Story

Bernard Lafayette Jr. is a longtime civil rights activist and organizer and who was a leader in the 1960s Freedom Riders movement.

He played a leading role in early organizing of the Selma, Ala. voting rights campaign, and was a member of the Nashville Student Movement.

Lafayette worked closely with groups such as the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, and the American Friends Service Committee.

He went on to work on the 1966 Chicago Open Housing Movement and later became president of the American Baptist Theological Seminary.

Lafayette now holds the post of Center for Nonviolence and Peace Martin Luther King Jr.
