

Police Cleared in Shooting

A grand jury Thursday found no criminal wrongdoing by Portland police in the May 12 fatal shooting of Keaton Otis. The 25-year-old African American motorist died in a confrontation after being pulled over for traffic infractions. Police say he grabbed a gun and started shooting.

Oil Spill Tanks BP Stock

BP's stock plummeted Tuesday as the federal government announced criminal and civil investigations into the Gulf of Mexico oil spill. BP engineers, meanwhile, tried to recover from a failed attempt to stop the gusher with an effort that will initially make the leak worse.

Israeli Raid Condemned

Worldwide condemnation was flooding in Tuesday after Israeli naval commandos halted a humanitarian aid flotilla trying to reached the sealed off Palestinian territory of Gaza in international waters Monday, setting off a melee that left nine activists dead and dozens wounded.

and legal problems, died Friday after suffering a brain hemmorage. He was 42.

Temptations Legend Loses Battle with Cancer

Ali-Ollie Woodson, who led the legendary Motown quintet The Temptations in the 1980s and '90s and helped re-



store them to their hit-making glory with songs including "Treat Her Like A Lady," died Sunday after battling cancer, a friend said. He was 58.

City May Tax Pot Grows

Oakland, Calif. soon could become the first U.S. city to sanction and tax commercial pot growing operations. City Council members are preparing legislation that would allow at least three industrial-scale growing operations.

TriMet Hikes Fares 5 Cents

The TriMet Board of Directors last week approved a 5-cent fare increase that will take effect on Sept. 1. The board also approved service cuts to help offset the agency \$27 million budget shortfall.
