The former Beatle brought down the house at a June 2 concert at the White House by belting out "Michelle," aiming its romantic lyrics straight at a first lady named Michelle.

After serenading the first lady with the words, "I love you, I love you, I love you," McCartney joked that he just might be the "first guy ever to be punched out by a president."

The president didn't seem to mind though: He was swaying along to the beat while his wife mouthed the words along with McCartney.



Bruce Smith, Ural Thomas and Calvin Walker, three local musicians who hit it big will make a presentation about Portland's R&B, blues and rock history.


The panel will focus on the vibrate music scene in north and northeast Portland from the 60s, 70s and 80s and answer questions from the audience.
