


Celebrating Juneteenth

Hundreds of people turned out for Portland's annual Juneteenth celebration on Saturday, June 19. State Rep. Lew Frederick, District 43, served as Grand Marshall. The parade featured Sable Scott, Miss Black Oregon; Multnomah County Commissioner candidate Loretta Smith, the U.S. Marines Honor Guard, and Clara Peoples, who established the Portland commemoration 38 years ago while working in the Kaiser shipyards during World War II.
