Military Finishes Report

The military released a report Tuesday on the impact of repealing the policy banning gays from serving openly in the military, finding that while some service members support the ban, allowing gays to serve openly would not have long-lasting negative consequences.

Support for Unemployed

Oregon Senators Jeff Merkley and Ron Wyden on Monday joined 27 of their colleagues in calling for a yearlong renewal of unem-



ployment benefits for millions of out-of-work Americans. Benefits for 2 million unemployed Americans are set to run out in December.

Hit Hard by Recession

A study of 150 major metro-area economies around the world shows that Portland plummeted from a pre-recession rank of 45th to its worst recession-era rank of 139th. It was one of the steepest declines among metro areas, after Las Vegas.

nounced the appointment of veteran policy and political advisor Chris Warner as her chief of staff. Warner cur-


rently serves as Gov. Ted Kulongoski's senior transportation adviser.
