education, and, Wallace said, school districts could lose state funding if there is no an anti-bullying policy in place.

Portland Public Schools recently stepped up its anti-bullying efforts which focus on prevention to create a safe and welcoming climate where students are not worrying about how they will be treated by their peers.

But with 201 school districts in the state, the coalition has a big challenge ahead of them in trying to see that the legislation is enforced across the board.

The Safe Schools Actis especially important now, as awareness of bullying among teens has increased in recent months, escalated after the reports of at least five young men who committed suicide as a result of peer harassment. This prompted "Savage Love" columnist Dan Savage and his partner to start the It Gets Better campaign, which involves celebrities, politicians, and citizens telling their stories of being bullied when better now.

According to the 2009 National School Climate Survey, a 10-year study documenting the experiences of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender students, nearly 9 out of 10 LGBT students experienced harassment at school in the past year and nearly two-thirds felt unsafe because of their sexual orientation.

study found that 84.6 percent of harassed (2.7 versus 3.1 percent). Center, and dozens of other groups LGBT students reported being verbally harassed, 40.1 percent reported being physically harassed and 18.8 percent reported being physically assaulted at their sexual orientation.



According to the survey:

Nearly two-thirds of students reported that they felt unsafe in school because of their sexual orientation, and more than a third felt unsafe because of their gender expression.
