"People are scared to be without coverage and of running out of medications, Ginsberg said, explaining how most of the patients the clinic sees need ongoing care and medical monitoring, but cannot afford it.

A 2009 report by the Census Bureau Official shows a spike in the number of Americans without health insurance from 4.3 million - to a record 50.7 million. Oregonians alone, make up over 643,000 of the country's uninsured, with the Multnomah County serving over 62,000 uninsured people last year, according to a recent

report.
