## Roosevelt Theatre Sails Ahead

## State, National awards fall on school's success

Donations are needed to help your local school drama group.

Roosevelt Theatre Troupe is elated about a state championship win and a national selection that grants their production of "the Yellow Boat," a spot on the main stage of the International Thespian Festival June 19-26, however trip expenses place them in a financial bind.

Early in the school year, Roosevelt High School's advanced acting class wanted a challenge, into the air. and after sifting through countless plays, their teacher and theatre director, Jo Lane, finally presented a script that moved the entire group to tears.

Chosen for production was David Saar's play "The Yellow Boat," based on a true story of the author's son and uniquely gifted visual artist, Benjamin Saar; born with congenital hemophilia, he lived until the age of 8 while suffering AIDS related complications.

Since auditions for the play, the troupe has performed one successful show after another, bringing home a state championship at the Oregon Thespian State Conference in April and winning Portland's firstever chance to perform on the main stage of the International Thespian Festival this summer in Lincoln, Neb.

"We are thrilled and honored to be the first PPS School to represent on the main stage," said Lane, who has worked with most of the senior drama students for about four years now.

The success is a significant leap for Roosevelt; bearing in mind that prior to Lane's arrival in the fall of 2007, no theatre program existed for 10 years at the north Portland school. As freshman, many of Lane's firsttime theatre students were clueless as to how to even sign up for a play, and in what usually takes six to eight years to build a program, Lane's drama group accomplished in less than four.

When the cast and crew heard that Yellow Boat was picked to compete against other schools from the United States, Canada, and around the world, they screamed and jumped

stunned by the victory, the troupe faces the reality of a huge financial roadblock, with nearly \$30,000 needed for the entire trip expendi-

The most cost-efficient route would fly the cast and crew from Portland to Omaha, where a shuttle bus would take them to Lincoln. The total breakdown includes \$12,000

for airfare, \$12,000 for registration, Now however, though still \$800 for shuttle service, and at least \$3,000 for hotel, food, stage reconstruction, and miscellaneous traveling expenses.

Fundraising for the trip is well underway, and the theatre troupe plans to perform excerpts of their play for those willing to provide online at roosevelttheatre.org. financial support.

In the meantime, the cast and crew, all seniors except for one junior, are focused on graduation.

throw graduation caps up in the air, they will begin fine-tuning the play that has been on and off, the center of their young lives for almost a year

"Every day--morning, noon, and night - we will have practice rehearsals," said Lane, who graduated from Central Washington with a Masters in Theatre Production and has been teaching theatre for over 15 years in Oregon.

If and when the Roosevelt Theatre Troupe arrives to the festival in Lincoln, they will only have 90 minutes to unload props and re- construct the stage set up before curtains go up, but in viewing the talented group's winning-streak record, there is little doubt that Yellow Boat will suffer anything short of success.
