




Flu Vaccine Decided

Property Tax Deferrals Limited Poor economy blamed for changes

enue has announced significant changes made by the 2011 Oregon Legislature to the Senior and Disabled Property Tax Deferral program.

Most of the changes, which will affect property tax payments starting in November, make qualifying for the program more difficult.

Created in the 1960s, the program allows qualifying seniors and people with disabilities to defer paying property taxes while they're living in their homes.

Currently about 10,500 Oregonians are enrolled in the program that pays their property taxes and charges interest, which they repay as they leave the program or sell Revenue sent letters to all current their homes.

Shots Fired Lead to Arrest

A 19-year-old male who police said was known to them as gang member was arrested Monday night at Unthank Park after authorities responded to a shots fired call at North Shaver Street and Kerby Avenue.

Authorities said Timothy Gaines appeared to be holding a handgun in his waistband when police arrived on the scene. While trying to make contact, Gaines took off running and threw the handgun which was recovered by officers.

According to Gang Enforcement Team investigators, Gaines was possibly the intended victim of the shooting, and the recovered hand-

gun was not used in the shooting. Police said witnesses described how a large, black SUV drove by a group of gang members, which included Gaines, when someone in the vehicle fired multiple shots at the group.

Gaines was taken to jail on charges of being a felon in possession of a firearm and unlawful possession of a firearm.

No one was hurt during the shooting.
