


Multidimensional World of Quilting



Art quilts by local and international artists are part of exhibit at the Oregon Historical Society, downtown.


The Oregon History Museum concludes its showcase of art quilts made by local and international artists as part of a showing that ends Sunday.

Founded in Britain in 1985, the traveling exhibit features artists from the United States and Europe. To insert a local element into the exhibit, a selection of historic quilts from the Oregon Historical Society's collection were added to the exhibit, as well as quilt art from 10 contemporary quilters in Oregon.

This unique exhibit presents beautiful works of art that delve into the human experience through the multidimensional world of quilting.

Using fabric, batting and stitching as their medium, quilt artists aim to extend the boundaries of quilting and achieve wider recognition for the quilt as an art form. Quilting inspiration comes from the most diverse places; from graffiti and landscapes to vibrant colors and rich textures. The common thread is a passion for creating and expressing oneself while introducing people to this art form.
