




The criminal charge is the result of a joint investigation by the FBI and IRS. On Aug. 10, FBI and Internal Revenue Service agents executed search warrants at McCoy's home in Hillsboro and at his Bureau of Transportation office in downtown Portland.

The indictment is only an accusation of a crime, and a defendant should be presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty, Marshall said.

### Candlelight Vigil for Murdered Teen

A candelight vigil was held on Monday at the East Portland Community Center in memory of 13year-old Julio Cesar Marquez, who was killed Nov. 6 in a suspected gang-related shooting.

Community members, family and friends came together to honor the brief life of Marquez, who is Portland's most recent and youngest victim of gang violence within the city in over a decade.

Marquez was an eighth grader at Rosie Hinton School, where teachers said he was well-liked and excelled in mathematics.

The vigil included words by the Marquez family, City Parks Com-

missioner Nick Fish, and other concerned community leaders about the rising rate of gangviolence throughout the city.

Martinez was a member of the skate team at the southeast Portland community center and spent a lot of time participating in the center's recreational programs.
