- The U.S. Congress passed the first Civil Rights
 Act since reconstruction. King's first book, Stride
 Toward Freedom, is published.
- On a speaking tour, Martin Luther King Jr. is nearly killed when stabbed by an assailant in Harlem. Met with President Dwight D. Eisenhower, along with Roy Wilkins, A. Philip Randolph, and Lester Grange on problems affecting black Americans.

1959

- Visited India to study Mohandas Gandhi's philosophy of nonviolence.
- Resigns from pastoring the Dexter Avenue

 Baptist Church to concentrate on civil rights full

 time. He moved to Atlanta to direct the activities

 of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference.


