I think people have more equal rights than before. We have a lot of diversity in our school, and we get along with each other.

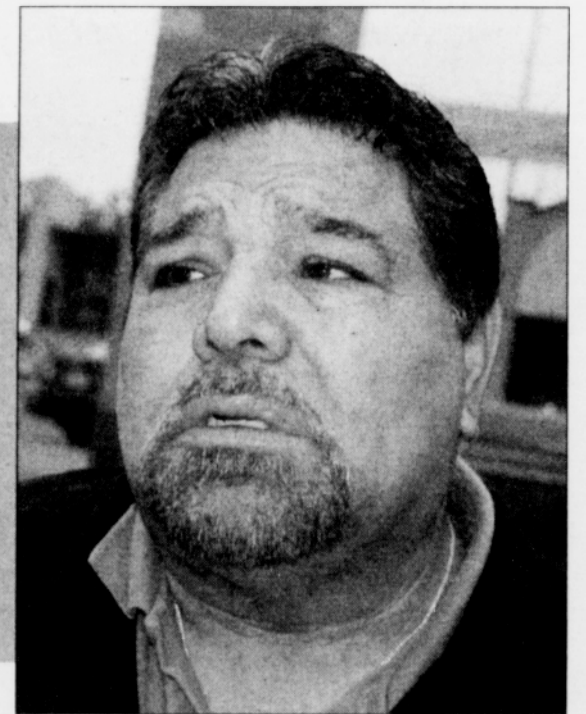

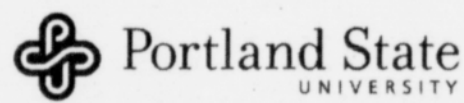
Not good at all. Our country should be run a little better, and people should be heard more.

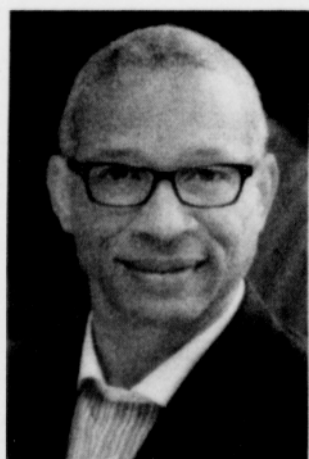
