Vote Backs Bridge Tolling

The Washington Senate on Tuesday approved a bill to allow tolling on Interstate 5 at the Oregon-Washington border for the \$3.5 billion Columbia River Crossing, in an effort to increase the revenue, which is expected to make up one third of the cost of the freeway and light-rail project. Oregon can proceed with tolling on the bridge without legislative approval.



Pipeline Controversy

Although the Obama Administration has withheld approval for the Keystone XL line, a group of senators, along with the backer of the project TransCanada Corp., is pushing legislation to improve the pipeline's chances to build the controversial \$7 billion oil line from Canada to Texas. Opponents are also gearing up, taking only 24 hours to gather 500,000 signatures against it.
