A Day to Remember

President Obama's 2nd Inauguration

(AP) - Asserting "America's possibilities are limitless," President Barack Obama declared on Monday that a decade of war is ending and the nation's economy is recovering as he launched into a second term before a flag-waving crowd of hundreds of thousands on the National Mall.

"My fellow Americans, we are



made for this moment, and we will seize it, so long as we seize it together," Obama said, moments after taking the oath of office on a crisp day in the nation's capital.

The president didn't dwell on any first-term accomplishments but looked to hard work ahead in a couneconomy.

"We must make the hard choices has consumed the past two years. to reduce the cost of health care and we reject the belief that America must choose between caring for the generation that built this country and investing in the generation that will build its future."

Hundreds of thousands of people try still grappling with a sluggish fanned out across the Mall, and millions more watched on televioffice to begin his second term.
