

Exhibit Open on July 4 Holiday


In celebration of the Oregon History Museum's new presidential exhibit "Windows on America," the museum will be open on Thursday, July 4 for Independence Day. Museum hours are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. On exhibit are two rare copies of the Declaration of Independence, never before on public display.

Americans treasured the declaration of July 4, 1776, asserting their independence. However, it was not until 1818 that Americans were able to see the text in engraved writing as opposed to print.

One of the copies of the document on display is from John Binns, a publisher of newspapers and engravings of famous Americans, whose illustrated work was reproduced in 1872 as the first photo-engraving in the world.

The second is a rare stone copy of the original Declaration. In 1802, John Quincy Adams hired William J. Stone to create an exact facsimile of the Declaration of Independence.

Another priceless treasure of American democracy on display is a hand-written letter from Thomas Jefferson to legislative leaders in the state of Georgia, expressing his appreciation for helping elect him to the presidency.
