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
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

Scanner technology gathers huge database

Portland Police are responding to an American Civil Liberties Union investigation on the use of high-tech police license plate scanners to record and monitor the movement of motor vehicles from

across the city.

Unlike the old method of getting behind a car and manually examining a vehicle's plates, the more familiar practice, this new technology automatically and electronically scans the license plate numbers of automobiles to the left, right, and ahead of the patrol car using it.

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Sequestration Cuts to Rental Assistance

Cuts to federal spending from sequestration will begin impacting rental assistance programs in Portland and Multnomah County.

Starting Aug. 1, participants in public housing and Section 8 programs will shoulder rent increases of 1 to 2 percent of their income, which is between \$1 and \$50 a month for most housing recipients, according to Home Forward, Portland's housing authority.
