

Hands Up, Don't Shoot!

Portland voices solidarity with citizens of Ferguson

Mother Killed in Gun Violence

'Enough is enough,' community says

A fatal shooting of a young mother at an apartment complex, combined with other shootings in southeast Portland and north Portland over the weekend, served as another grim highlight to this summer's violence and was the backdrop to a meeting on Monday to address community concerns.

African American family members who have lost loved ones to

previous outbreaks of gun violence gathered at the police bureau's North Precinct Monday night to volunteer their efforts in an antiviolence campaign titled "Enough is Enough." The community-led effort is encouraging residents to speak out against violence and work as partners with the police to help homicide investigators.

Ervaeua Ronchelle Herring, 21, was shot and killed at the Eastwood Village Apartments, 14139 S.E. Powell Boulevard on Sunday. The same morning, a shooting at Southeast Third Avenue left several wounded, as well as a nighttime shooting in-Northgate Park on Fessenden Street leaving one man injured.
