Vancouver Vets Day Parade

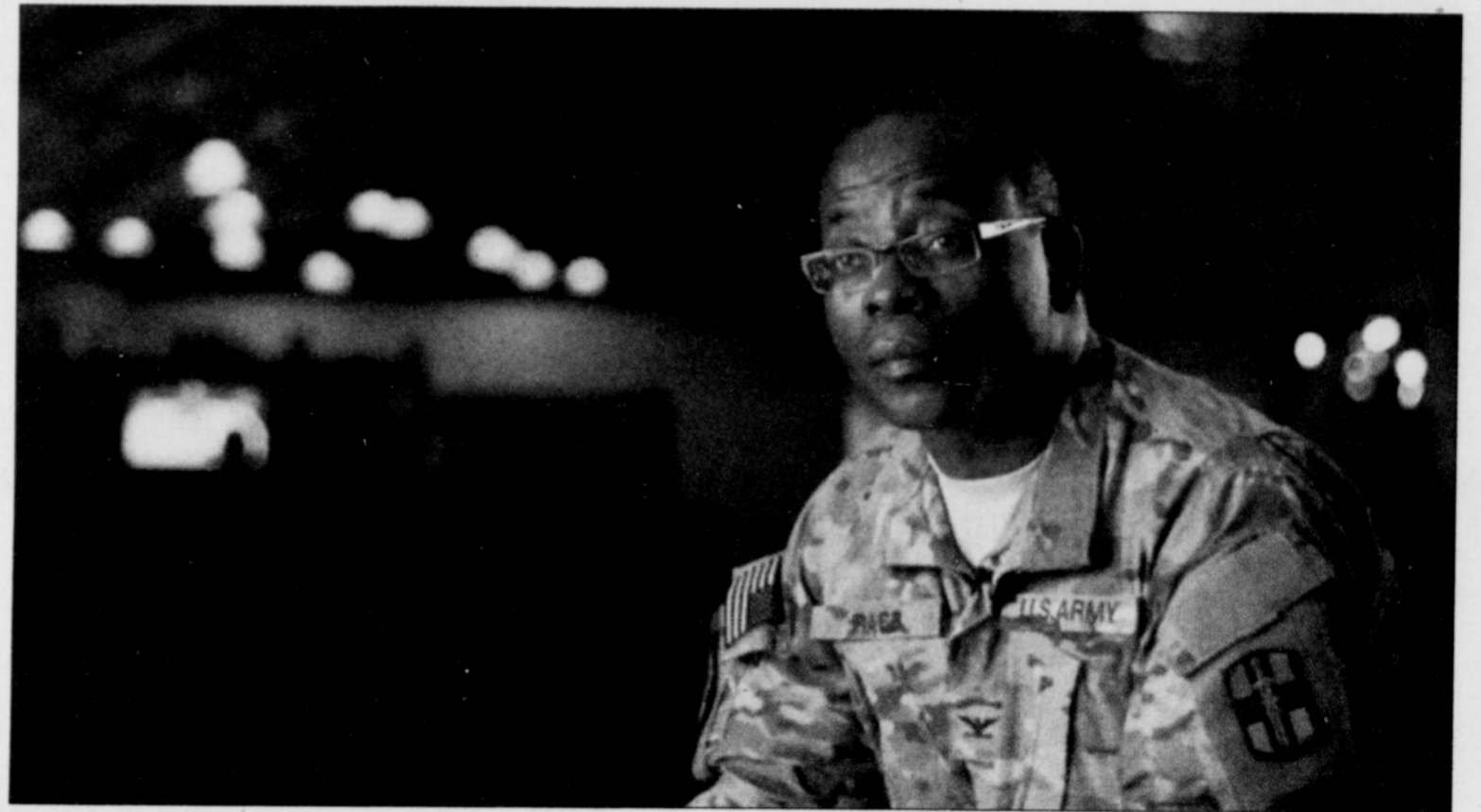
The Fort Vancouver National Trust is hosting the 28th Annual Veteran's Day Parade this Saturday, Nov. 8 rain or shine.

An opening ceremony will precede the parade, beginning at 10 a.m. on the Marshall House lawn, featuring keynote speaker General Stephen R. Lanza of Joint Base Lewis-McChord.

Afterwards, local veterans will

step forward to share their words and experiences, and honor local veterans and the parade's grand marshal Dale Bowlin. The parade procession will follow at 11 a.m. from the east end of Officers Row at East Reserve Street.

The Vancouver parade attracts more than 120 entries with approximately 2,500 individuals marching or riding in the parade.

'Mind Zone' documentary follows impacts of war

'Mind Zone' a documentary about mental health and the military will screen on Veterans Day, Tuesday Nov. 11 at 6 p.m. as part of the 41st Northwest Filmmakers Festival at Whitsell Auditorium, 1219 S.W. Park Ave.

The film by clinical psychologist and Portland State University professor emeritus Jan Haaken follows therapists with the 113th Army Combat Stress Control detachment as they carry out two conflicting missions: protect-

ing soldiers from battle fatigue and keeping these same soldiers in the fight.

As the 113th is deployed to Afghanistan and trains for their dual

Black Airman to Share Story

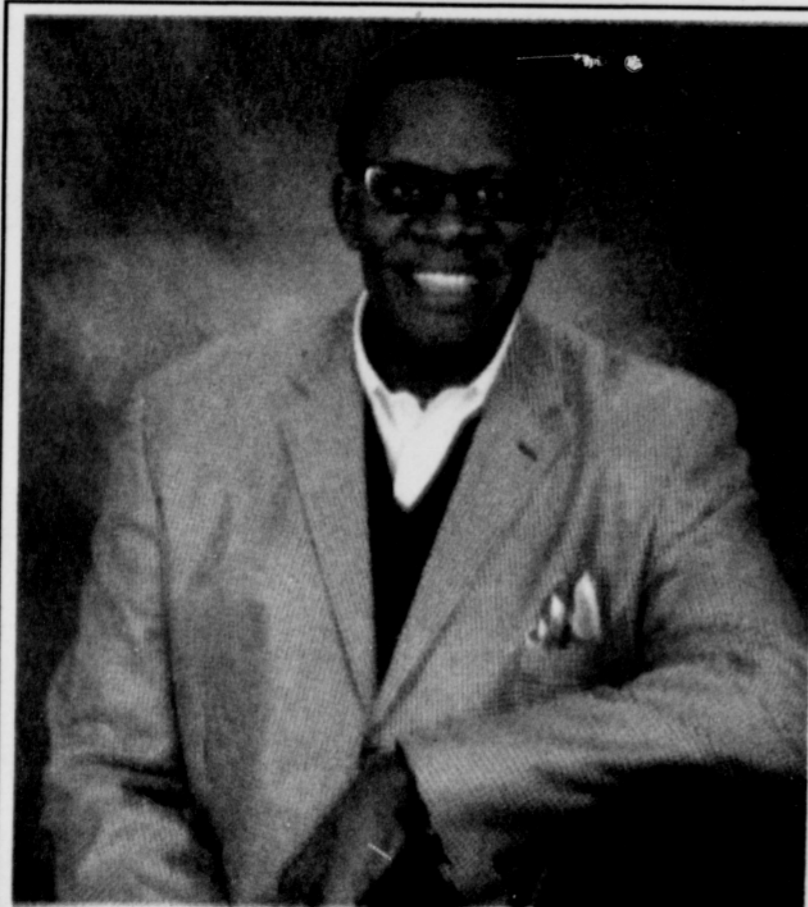
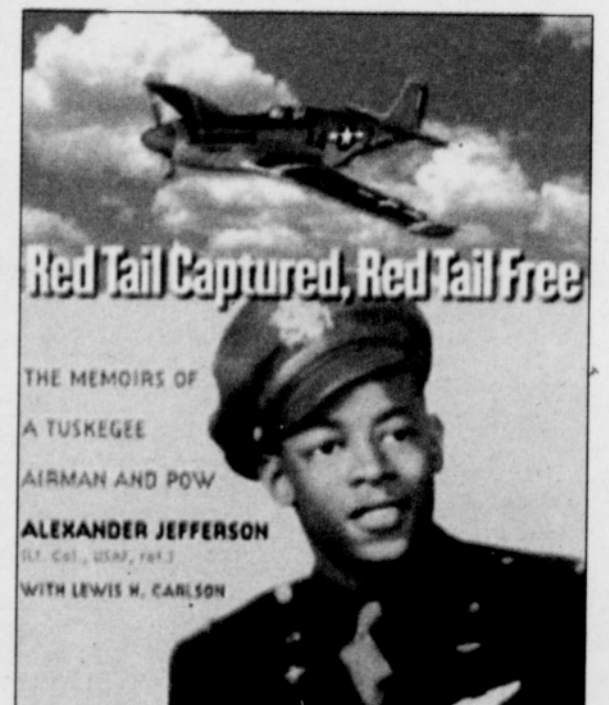


Alexander Jefferson
