## Tours brings African American history to life

A local genealogist and historian is bringing local African American history to life with his community tours project.

Stephen Hanks takes groups on walking tours in downtown Portland to showcase some of the first places where black people lived in the city and state.

"I realized people didn't know just how



long black people had been a part of Oregon," Hanks explained. "But we've been here, we'll keep being here, and our roots run deep."

Just how deep those roots run became clear to Hanks when he was doing ancestral research, trying to figure out how many, if any, black people lived in Portland when Oregon became a state in 1859 and during the early years following statehood.

After going through old Census records, city directories, books, and news articles
