Development Commission proposal for a Trader Joes grocery to be built a few blocks away on Northeast MLK and Alberta. That plan was withdrawn over community protests for failing to address a critical shortage of housing serving local residents. In its place is a proposed Natural Grocers store, and Monday's announcement included an update for the MLK and Alberta property with Colas Construction, a blackowned Portland company, and Majestic Realty, a Los Angeles developer, planning to break ground on the store and other commercial retrial space sometime this fall.

"Through their focus on commercial activity and affordable housing, both projects will add to the vitality and diversity of the community, and will serve to underscore our commitment to this vital section of northeast Portland," said Commissioner Saltzman.

"This is a happy, long awaited day," said Mayor Charlie Hales.

Travis Phillips, the housing development manager for PCRI, said that there would be a community engagement process to decide what kind of units to build and how many of them will go into the space provided. This will better equip them to share precisely how many units will be available in the new space.
