Unhealthy Smoke Billows

Oregon and Washington wild-fires sent billows of smoke over the Portland metro area Saturday, bringing air to 'unhealthy' levels. The smoke peaked late Saturday afternoon and slowly dissipated Sunday and Monday.

Harrison Park School Fire

Fire crews responded to an alarm at Harrison Park School in southeast Portland just after 2 a.m. Monday, where they found smoke in the building's hallway and fire damage to a classroom. The cause of the fire was an unknown electrical failure. Damages were estimated at \$30,000. No one was injured.



Fatal Motorcycle Wreck

A motorcycle rider was killed Sunday evening in a crash on North Marine Drive. Joshua Michael Terry, 20 had just left Kelly Point Park with a group of motorcycle and car performance enthusiasts and was traveling at a high rate of speed when he collided with a pickup truck that was making a U-turn, police said. A vigil was held Monday night at the location of the crash.

On Saturday authorities arrested two suspects in connection with a shoplifting incident at Kohl's in northeast Portland's Gateway District. Christopher Jones II and Tiffany Treneice Goudy were caught after police say Jones failed to stop for police and drove off at a high speed.

Shooting and Crash

A 21-year-old Portland man was seriously injured when the driver of the car he was riding in crashed into a power pole at the intersection of North Vancouver Avenue and Holman Street while attempting to elude a man who was firing a gun at them, according to Portland police.

King School Park Shooting

On Monday shortly after noon, Portland Police officers responded to a shooting on the west side of King School Park, about a block south of Northeast Alberta Street and just east of Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard.

A woman suffered a hand injury from the gun fire. Police say Anastasia Madison, 20, was sitting in the park with two men when someone in an SUV fired multiple shots at the group, striking Madison.

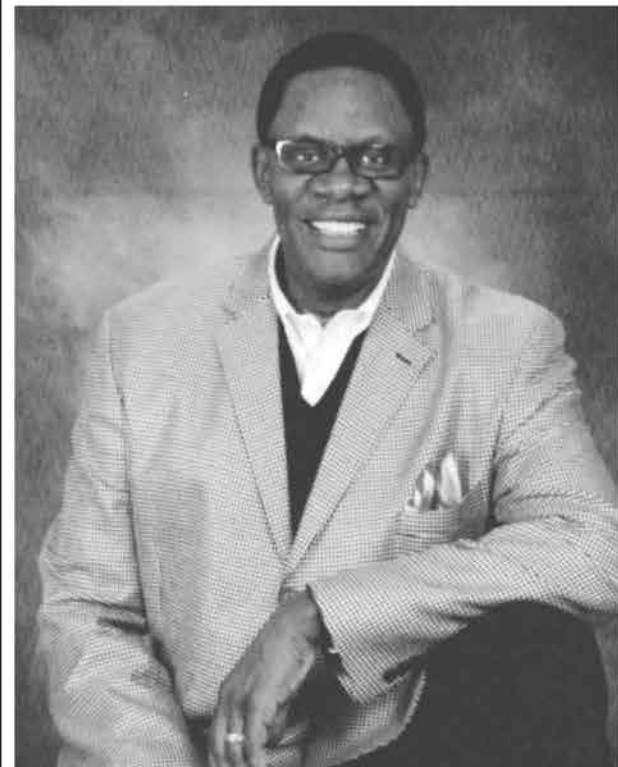
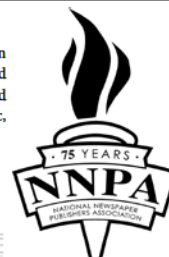
