Repeal and Replace Dead

Republicans were reeling Tuesday after the Senate's three Republican women declared their opposition and killed the GOP's effort to repeal and replace the Affordable Care Act, a failure to make good on a GOP promise that has defined the party for nearly a decade and has been one of Trump's top priorities.

Trump Approval at All Time Low

Polls by ABC News and the Washington Post on Monday reported Trump's approval ratings at an all time low of 36 percent the lowest in 70 years for a new president. Portland Superintendent Search Narrows

The newly comprised Portland Public School Board has interviewed seven candidates to lead the district as its next superintendent and chosen four finalists, all which have experience as educators, school officials reported Monday. It's the second attempt to

Schools Discrimination Case Upheld

A Multnomah County judge on Monday upheld a May jury verdict against Portland Public Schools awarding two black maintenance workers \$500,000 each for enduring a racially hostile work environment.

Since 2012, gonorrhea cases have tripled across the state, as drug resistant strains of the disease are increasing. If left untreated, gonorrhea can have permanent and long term health problems for both men and women. Officials in some counties are launching online awareness and door to door campaigns to help get people treated.

Protest Shooter Sentenced


