

Costing Far More Than They Produce-Population of German East Africa Decreasing.

Official reports demonstrate that famine Official reports demonstrate that famine and sickness in German East Africs have deviationed that colony. In the district of Tanga, for example, within the year 1838 the population has been diminished from 182,26 to 84,285, owing to famine, herosy, smallpox and typhoid fever. The condi-tions of the whole colony appears appailing. The trade of this colony, which is threa-times the size of Germany, is insignificant, and mustly with British India, while the cost to Germany is flucted the whole trade. The Cologne Volks Zeitung mys the rall-road prejects for the colonies now adopt-ed causant to 200,000,00 marks, while on the other hand German trade with the British colonies amounts to 300,000,000 marks, without entailing a cent of ex-pense. 
