He came on the hospital-ship Relief, which salled shortly afterwards, and was able to visit his company occasionally while waiting for muster-out at the Presidio. From there he went to Southern California, where he remained until he began to grow weaker again from dreaded dysentery, and then started to his relatives in New York that he might die at home. Johnson was well known in Al-bina before enlisting in the Second Oreton, as he was in partnership with a resident of Aibina in the bakery business for some time previous. His fate has been the same as many of the soldiers who re-turned from the islands believing they






