

A FINE BASEBALL GAME

CHEMAMAWA BEATS MULTNOMAH BY SCORE OF 13 TO 10.

Indians Carry to Their Teepees the
Scalps of the Long Victorious
White Men.

Baseball of the right sort was played at Multnomah Field yesterday afternoon between Chemamawa Indian School and Multnomah Amateur Athletic Club, in which game the Chemamawas were winners by a score of 13 to 10. Multnomahs lost the game in the first three innings, when the Chemamawas made all their runs off Johnnie Harkins, who evidently had an off day. The Indians made five runs in the first inning, three in the second, and five in the third, having no consideration for Harkins' ordinarily deceptive curves. Whitehouse, Multnomah's regular pitcher, was called in to the fourth, and from then until the end the Indians were blanked, making but two little harmless hits, and at no time passing second base. It looks as if the score would have been 19 to 9 in the home team's favor had Whitehouse pitched throughout.

A large crowd enjoyed the good game on an ideal baseball afternoon. The bleachers and grandstand were thoroughly full in their encouragement, as the Chemamawa boys have always put up good ball on Portland's diamond.

In the early part of the game, of course, the Indians' batting, pounding the leather every which way, was the feature. Portland could not find Graham, the Indian pitcher, to any great extent, for the first four innings, and when they would knock a ball out of the diamond a dusky boy would always be under it. And their fielding was of the half-raising order, sure enough. With the handicap of 13 to 9 at the end of the fourth inning, Multnomah found Graham thereafter apparently quite easy; either that or Graham let up, and it did not look that way. By timely batting in the sixth inning, Multnomah piled up five runs, and added another bunch of three in the eighth.

With the score 13 to 10 in the last half of the ninth, and the Multnomahs with a batting streak on, it looked as if the proverbial "luck" would materialize, but three hands were down in short order, and a rattling good game was over.

To particularize for Chemamawa would be unfair where all, even the little redskin Bregon, who fielded in the right garden, did such heavy hitting, but surely the battery, Graham and Teabo, were the stars. For Multnomah, Whitehouse and Almslie, the battery, carried off the honors. Almslie's work, with the exception of an overthrow to second base, being excellent. Had the fielders done better work in support of Harkins in the first three innings, hits that were scored against him might have been counted as put-outs. Doubt, the new man at short, played all-around good ball.

LIVELY SAILING RACE.

Three Winners in Oregon Yacht Club Contest.

Agnes, Curio and Spray were the winners among three classes in the regatta of the Oregon Yacht Club last night. The wind was but fair, having calmed down from a stiff northwest that promised to make excellent sailing. However, there was enough breeze to carry the boats along, and the best craft won.

Gilbert Dalglish ran his admiral's flag up precisely at 6:14. The red flag was hoisted at 6:18 and the gun boom started at 6:20. Agnes was the first to get over the line at 6:19, and the other boats followed, a quarter of a minute apart. In the following order: Hazel, Owyhee, Lark and Swallow.

Class C was sent off at 6:23, Curio cutting the line first, with the Quickest closely at her heels. The blue flag for class A was hoisted at 6:24, and the Turtle and Spray passed the line evenly a quarter of a minute after. The Lilly and Hare passed at 6:25, and the Alice at 6:28.

The start was a very pretty sight. The boats all clung together, tacking first on one side, then on the other, in order to get the full sweep of the varying wind. Rowboats, launches and pleasure yachts followed the racers along the course and cheered the yachtsmen on to victory. The Madison street bridge was crowded all night, and when the Agnes completed the course first, the people gave voice to a lusty shout, which seemed to put a look of satisfaction on Ira Hill's face.

Interest was foremost in class B. The Agnes was ahead most of the time, though on the home stretch the first time around the Swallow made good speed and gained the lead, which place she kept only a short time. The first in this class was a pair of marine glasses. Owyhee, Taylor skipper, came in second.

In class C, Curio, Morey skipper, won a four-inch speed contest. Quickest was a close second in this race. Dave Jordan's Spray outclassed all the other boats in class A and won out easily, taking a 15-pound anchor and cable for the trouble. His success is due much to superior handling of the boat, in which he was materially assisted by Peter McCracken.

LABORERS IN DEMAND.

Gangs of Them Sent to Wyoming to Work.

Gangs of laboring men are being sent out daily from Portland to Green River, Wyo., where the Union Pacific has two years' work laid out for a large number. To guard against hauling professional trouble over the road, the contractors require each applicant for work to sign an iron-clad agreement, specifying the wages they will work for and the length of time they will work.

Men are also being sent to work on the Mohawk Valley Railroad, in Lane County, Oregon, where the wages have just been raised from \$15 a day to \$20. The demand for laboring men in Portland will exceed the supply, according to the employment agents.

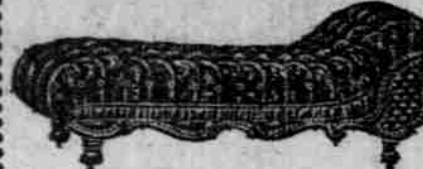
LIGHT DAY'S BUSINESS.

Council Street Committee Disposes of Minor Matters.

A light attendance at the meeting yesterday of the street committee indicated the extent of the business of the day. Beyond granting the prayers of a few petitioners for minor street improvements and recommending action by the Council, nothing was done. A remonstrance was filed with the committee in favor of the Portland & Oregon City Street Railway Company's right to use Madison street during certain hours of the day to load and unload freight hauled by the line.

Some persons complained a short time ago because the company's cars were left on the street. The remonstrance filed yesterday stated that the company did not unnecessarily block the street, but left the cars there only in the course of business; that it was highly convenient to business men and beneficial to adjacent property. Unless the company has the privilege of loading its cars unobstructed along the track, as do other street-car
