Therefore, the Governor of Oregon has done well to let the wedding bells a-ringing at this particular season.

"A quiet affair," was the way the announcement read, but to judge from the fine raincoat that made its first appearance last Thursday afternoon, at 4, it must have been as elegant as it was "quiet." The bride's trousseau was not, it is said, the product of "home industry," having been made and purchased in San Francisco. Some of the gowns worn by the guests were marvels of elegance.
