

IT ENTAILS MUCH WORK

WORKING UP A BIG CELEBRATION IS NOT EASY.

Portland Will Have a Great One, and the Committee is Correspondingly Busy.

The faster the Fourth approaches the greater is the task which the men of the Fourth of July committee have assumed. Few people realize the work which a Fourth of July celebration entails. The men in charge, when they listen to a band concert in a plaza prettily decorated for the occasion; see the streets illuminated with red, white and blue, and a long parade of floats, and the military bands, and the beautiful, emblematical floats, led by a strong military force; attend literary exercises, witness regattas, baseball games, horse races and bicycle events—all arranged for their entertainment and amusement—little do they realize the amount of work that has been spent upon the miscellaneous details. In order to please the public a committee has been formed, planning their expenditure and working like a great machine to produce a grand and harmonious result.

The Fourth is upon us," was the cry last evening at the conference of all the chairmen of the subcommittees of the general Fourth of July finance committee, presided over by General Summers. All the committee reports were read, and have their affairs well in hand, so that this year's three days' celebration will be virtually a \$10,000 demonstration, though costing less than one-half that sum.

For fireworks, Chairman Robinson was allowed a liberal amount, and he will spend it in illuminating the line of march with red, white and blue fire, and in providing fine floats for each division.

He will send up rockets, roman candles, fire balloons, in a virtual fountain of flame. The Chinese division, under Commander Seld, Jr., will also provide a float for each division, and animal and aquatic balloons that will attract attention.

Chairman Meier, of the decoration committee, has plans for making the city assume a festive appearance during the three days by erecting 10 double arches at the corners of the principal streets. These will be made of evergreen and bunting, and from the top will hang large American flags. In the evening they will be illuminated with Chinese lanterns. He has also arranged for the decoration of the Park blocks during the day and night.

It was decided to turn over a parade float to the Portland carnival committee after the Fourth.

For music during the three days, Chairman Robinson has secured all of the available bands in the city, and they will be well utilized for the different events. In addition to the local bands, the Chemawin Indian band and the Silverton band have been engaged.

Major C. U. Gantenben, chairman of the parade committee, reported that invitations had been sent to all the fraternal and civic organizations, and they were responding rapidly with applications for positions in the parade. The Native Sons will have the float representing the state of Oregon, and the Chemawin Indian band will have a unique representation. Outside military organizations in Sumpter, Woodburn and Oregon City have also been invited to attend, and summer regiments will also tender an invitation to the Vancouver troops.

It was decided that all applicants for positions in the parade for floats should be made to the secretary before June 25. The amusement committee reported that so far arrangements had been made to incorporate in the programme the regatta between the crews of Vancouver, Victoria and the 4th, a baseball game on the afternoon of the 4th, the 4th between the Multnomah Club and the Chemawin Indian team, and bicycle features.

Monday evening the general committee meets at its headquarters, room 69, Chamber of Commerce building.

EAST SIDE AFFAIRS.

School Children's Interest in Birds—Other Matters.

The teachers of the Brooklyn School have accomplished a good work in instilling in the minds of the pupils a desire for preserving the birds in that portion of the city. Early in the year Miss J. L. Lick, the principal, introduced the study of Oregon birds into all the classes, and great interest has been shown. The need of protecting the feathered songsters was constantly and strongly urged. Rev. E. R. Lord, of the Unitarian Church, talked to the pupils several times about the birds. The good effect of this school work is more numerous this season than ever before. They are very tame and come about the houses with perfect freedom. Boys are not going about with guns shooting birds in that part of the city. The people there attribute this to the teachings in the school.

At Stephens School on another line much good has been accomplished in the way of instructing pupils to respect the rights of dumb animals, and especially the birds. At this school Miss Eugene Kern has in charge of a large group of pupils who have been making special study along these lines. Weekly meetings have been held Wednesday afternoons, devoted to a study of the habits of the animals. Short addresses have been given, and the pupils instructed in the habits of the animals and shown how useful they are to mankind.

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NOW HAS HEADQUARTERS

STREET FAIR AND CARNIVAL COMMITTEE AT HOME TO ALL.

New Plans Being Perfected Daily—Subscriptions Are Coming in and All Goes Well.

The Elks' committee which is working upon the preliminaries for the street fair and carnival has opened headquarters in the Marquam building, the store room at the northeast corner of Seventh and Morrison. These headquarters became necessary through the great amount of business which is falling upon the committee and the hundreds of letters that are coming from all quarters. The magnitude of the undertaking becomes more apparent each day, and the literature upon street fairs which the committee has collected would make quite a little library, and there is more coming.

A Captain Young, now stationed at Vancouver, who is a member of the Detroit Fourth of July committee, is enthusiastically in favor of the fair. His lodge in Detroit held a street fair last year, which continued for two weeks, and did the city more good in the way of advertising than any previous event in its history. "The people gave us the town," said Captain Young.

"It was a perfect blast of glory all the time, and when we were through they told us we could keep the city, for we had earned it. Your people have a great surprise in that line awaiting them here." The committee is considering bringing to Portland the manager of the Detroit fair, if possible, and having him make a tour of the city.

The last efforts in subscriptions will be made this week. Those who have not contributed will be called on. Many have contributed a doubling and tripling the amount. Every dollar for building material, music, and other contributions to the fund, as well as assisting in the management.

Headquarters will be open daily. The Elks will meet Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock to finish arranging their committees, and all ladies of Portland desiring to assist are cordially invited to be present.

No Sheep on Bull Run.

A press dispatch from Washington, published in the Oregonian on the 14th inst., stated that the Secretary of the Interior had just signed permits allowing the grazing of sheep on the Cascade, Ashland and the Bull Run Reserves in Oregon, and that sheep will be allowed to enter these reserves immediately. The next day Captain S. B. Ormsby, superintendent of the Bull Run Reserve, stated, in the columns of this paper, that the Washington dispatch was incorrect, and that no grazing will be allowed on the Bull Run Reserve, nor anywhere north of the White River, nor anywhere south of the White River. He stated that the Washington dispatch was a telegram sent to Hon. Ringer Hermann, Commissioner of the General Land Office, that no sheep should be allowed to graze on the Bull Run Reserve, and that the limit hereof should be observed.
