DEATH OF MRS. PATRICK MORAN.—Mrs. Mary Moran, who died in this city on Friday last, was born at Dobbs Ferry, New York, 47 years ago. She removed with her mother, Mrs. Scott, to San Francisco in 1857, where she was married a year or two later to Patrick Moran, who has been known for many years in connection with the O. R. & N. Mrs. Moran was one of the gentlest and kindest of women, a good wife, mother and neighbor, who, though she led a retired, domestic life, is mourned by a wide circle of acquaintances. For the last 23 years she had resided continuously at the family residence on Ninth street, near Flinders, and during all that time lived in the utmost peace and harmony with all around her. She left a husband and family, comprising the Misses Nelly and May, and John and Willie; her mother and a brother to sincerely mourn her loss. The funeral will take place at 2 o'clock today from St. Mary's Cathedral, and the interment will be in St. Mary's cemetery.

PAYING THE INTEREST.—City Treasurer Frank Hachney yesterday forwarded \$12,500 to the National Park Bank of New York to meet the semiannual interest on the bridge bonds, which is due July 1. There are 100 of these interest coupons, of \$25 each, amounting in all to \$2,500. The bank charges one-fourth of 1 per cent commission, which makes up the balance of the bill. This, however, is only a small part of the city's interest bill which falls due July 1. The interest on the water bonds, amounting to \$20,000, and interest on the City Hall debt, amounting to \$16,875, both fall due in July and January. The Treasurer is ready to meet these demands, and the money will be paid at his office the day it is due.
