The latter, it is intended, shall act as a balance of power between the others, and keep things amicable. The matter came up in court yesterday, and this course was agreed upon.

## JUDGE DENNY'S WILL.

He Left All of His Property to His Wife.

The will of Owen N. Denny, deceased, was admitted to probate in the County Court yesterday. The estate is devised to Gertrude J. Denny, the wife, who is named as executrix, without bond. There are no children. The property consists mainly of large tracts of land located in Yamhill, Polk and Gilliam counties, Oregon; also certain lands with orchards in Clark County, Washington; also another tract of about 220 acres or the proceeds thereof in Clark County, Washington; also certain lands and lots in Multnomah County, a list of all of which and the probable value of the estate is impossible to bring to the attention of the court until the appraisal is made. The will was executed March 22, 1900, and was witnessed by R. R. Giltner and Charles H. Carey. It is a brief instrument. One of its provisions states: "I am involved to some extent financially, and a portion of my lands are mortgaged, and for the protection of my estate I desire a subsequent confirmation of any court, to sell any of my real estate and to borrow money thereon as she may deem proper, and execute the same, and the proper mortgage to secure the same, or any or all of the real estate of which I may be seized and possessed."

Roy H. Hurley, W. H. Hall and James P. O. Lowrey are appointed appraisers in Multnomah County; Millard O. Lowrey, A. R. Burbank and Roy M. Huriburn in Yamhill County, and appraisers are to be appointed in other places where lands are located.

## Probate Matters.

James Muldoon and T. B. McDewitt, executors of the will of Mary Albert, deceased, yesterday filed a petition in the County Court stating that there is \$268 on hand; that the funeral bill of George B. Dunning was \$24; that the commissions of the executors amount to over \$400, and the probable cost of the administration will be about \$600. Permission is asked to pay Dunning \$500 on account, and to retain the balance of the money for the executors' commissions and expenses. The estate is valued at \$1,448. Property will be sold to pay the balance of the claims.

The final account of J. G. McElroy, administrator of the estate of Henry J. Thompson, deceased, was filed. The receipts were \$2,000, the disbursements \$225, leaving \$1,775 on hand. The real property is appraised at \$23,000. Part of this property was devised to the wife, Josephine Thompson, and the remainder in trust for the children—Joseph E., Josephine, Maud, Herbert and Ralph Thompson. Mrs. Thompson died about one hour after her husband, and as the children are all minors, John B. Coffey was appointed their guardian. The property will be distributed when the youngest child becomes of age.
