### Account of One of the Earliest Boxer Outrages.

SEATTLE, July 12.—A. J. Bailey, of Seattle, is in receipt of two communications from the Rev. Horace W. Houlding, of the Independent Missionary Service. The first is dated January 4, 1900, from the temporary home of the Society of the Mission in Shan Tung Province. It incloses a letter written by Dr. Arthur H. Smith to United States Minister Conger at Peking, dated June 1, 1900, on the eve of the Boxer outbreaks. The second letter was written June 11, from Pei Tsin, on the north coast of China, where the missionaries and traders were during each Summer. The first letter is in part as follows:

January 6, 1900.—**My Friends:** The trouble with the United States or the Boxers still continues. At one time it was deemed likely that we should all be forced to face the Winter and starve for Tien Tsin. December 6 was the day set for raiding us at Lin Ching. You know there is quite a strong station of the American Board Mission here. Many letters by courier and many telegrams have passed between the American Board of Missionaries and the United States Minister, Mr. Kohn. The Chinese and the Christians are suffering severely. The way they "endure hardness" has won my admiration. Scores and even hundreds of men and women have been robbed and oftentimes beaten, and ruthlessly driven from pillaged and burning homes into the bitter cold of Midwinter.

I propose here to copy the principal parts of the last letter sent Mr. Conger

"Wang Chuang, December 20, 1896.—Hon. E. H. Conger, United States Minister, Peking—Dear Sir: I think I mentioned to you a week ago that there were about 200 Chinese Boxer ruffians in the village of Hochiutun by a band of Boxer ruffians from Thing Ping. The evidence that mischief was intended is strong. We thought it prudent to address a letter to each of the district magistrates. The 'Ching Ping' official did not deign to reply."

"The morning of December 28 the Boxers appeared at the village in a force represented as between 100 and 200, of whom perhaps 30 were cavalry. One party made for our chapel and school-house, the doors of which they broke in and then, after the school children had fled, pulling out the window frames and burning them with the doors for fuel. 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by the mission anused as our private headquarters for this district. This place was also looted and wrecked. One party of the pillagers made the house the helper who lives in this village, who house they entered and pillaged. The members of the family escaped over the wall, one house down the river, and having a narrow escape from capture. The Presbyterian Mission has had 65 families looted up to December 18, and 1000 persons taken to the interior, about 80 up to yesterday, and fresh cases daily reported. Not a single Roman Catholic family of any importance has escaped. Their chapels destroyed are countless."
