WILL PREACH ON CHINA

BISHOP EARL CRANSTON AT GRACE M. E. CHURCH THIS EVENING.

Services That Will Be Observed Today in Portland's Places of Worship.

This evening Bishop Earl Cranston, of the Methodist Church, will preach on the subject of "China" before the united congregations of the Grace Methodist Episcopal and First Baptist Church. The services will be held at the Grace M. E. Church, corner Twelfth and Taylor streets. No one is better qualified from thorough knowledge and experience in Chinese affairs to speak on this theme, both from the standpoint of the layman or the churchman.

BRAVE ARTHUR VENVILLE

HIS MOTHER RECEIVES A LETTER FROM GILMORE.

There is a Possibility That the Sellwood Lad is Still Alive in the Interior of Luzon.

While we honor the memory of Scott Harrington and the heroes of the Spanish War, there is one whom we should always remember with the other brave Oregon boys who never came back—Arthur Venville, of Sellwood, who was with the Gilmore party in Luzon.

In Lieutenant Gilmore's story in the August McClure's record of Venville's courage and grit when under fire the first time is one of which Oregon may indeed be proud.

"In the story of the boat battle he says: 'I remember most vividly the fierce desire I had to get back at the foe—to see some of them fall and bite the dust and writhe in pain as some of our own men were doing. For a short time the fighting instinct crowded out of my mind pity and fear. Having no other weapon than a revolver, useless at that range, I reached for a rifle which had been dropped by one of the dead. It had been hit on the lock and the clip was jammed."

Venville, one of our apprentice boys, attempted to fix the clip. A bullet went through the flesh of his neck. 'Mr. Gilmore, I'm hit,' he said. But he continued working at the rifle. A second shot plowed through the boy's breast and came out in his armpit. 'You're hit again, Mr. Gilmore!'

"He was still trying to pull out the jammed clip, when a ball cut a furrow in the left side of his head. 'Mr. Gilmore, they've hit me again!' he cried. 'I've hit a ball crashed into his ankle, inflicting a painful hurt. There was just a slight quiver in the lad's voice as he looked up at me. 'Mr. Gilmore, I'm hit once more, but the gun is fixed, sir!'

This saying, in its coolness, seems finer than the great Admiral's celebrated order: 'You may fire when ready, Gridley.' Venville was left a prisoner at Baler and although there was a rumor that he had been seen the last of May, no definite news was received until July 21, when a letter came from Captain W. D. Newbill, at Baler, June 6, saying that two friars, who had been prisoners of the Philippines, and who knew Venville, had been found and liberated by the Americans. They stated that he was at Baler just before the arrival of the Funston expedition, which arrived February 20.

He had been at Baler since his capture, and had been treated kindly, though compelled to act as a servant. On the approach of the Americans the friars, as well as Venville, were hurried off to San Jose, and on May 15 they woke up from a sleeta to find Venville gone.

They had become much attached to him and asked where he had been taken. The Philippines replied that he had been taken away and was being looked after, but they believe he has been killed, as he must have had much damaging evidence against the insurgents. When the news came that the Gilmore party was rescued without Venville, his mother, Mrs. Mash, was greatly overjoyed, but she has received a number of letters from his comrades, all expressing a hope of his being alive, and now she believes he will come back.

The men said that on account of his boyish appearance the native women took pity on him, bound up his wounds with cool leaves and gave him milk to eat with his rice, kindnesses which were not bestowed on the other wounded.

Under date of June 6, 1900, Lieutenant Gilmore wrote from Washington: "My Dear Mrs. Mash—Your letter of March 10 has just been received. Your son was with me in the boat and acted with the greatest coolness and bravery, for which I highly commended him to the Navy Department. When we who could travel were marched to the insurgent capital (San Isidro), the three men seriously wounded, including your son, had to be left behind. When I last saw him he was doing well and I thought would be all right in a short time."

"On my return to Manila, after being rescued, I saw the two men who had been left with your son. They said that when they had recovered from their wounds they were marched to the interior, but that at that time, although your son was recovered, he was not able to stand the rough march, and so had to be left behind."

"I went to our Admiral and told him the facts. He said that everything had been done to discover the whereabouts of Venville, but nothing could be found out. He must have been taken to the interior and there found either American prisoners."

"I hope and trust that he will come out all right, for there was no braver man in the boat with me."

Mrs. Mash also received a letter from Admiral Watson, in which he writes: "I hope you know where to turn in such trouble and have already experienced the comfort of banking in the infinite love of our Savior. With much sympathy, I am, J. C. Watson, Rear-Admiral, U. S. N."

"The bravest are the tenderest," seems always to have been exemplified in Arthur Venville, for he was very tender to his mother, always loving to his little brothers and sisters.
