HINTS FOR HOUSEKEEPERS.

If a bathtub has part of its enamel worn off, It is hard to keep it clean. It is very easy, however, to re-enamel an old tub at slight expense. Scrub it first with a strong solution of sods in water When perfectly dry, apply the first of enamel. Allow this two days in which to dry, and then put on the second coat. After this has dried for 24 hours, fill the tub with cold water and let the water stand six hours. Empty, dry thoroughly and add the third coat of paint.

There are several ways to clean an enameled bathtub. One that is easy and quick is to pour some benzine on a cloth; scour the bathtub well with it, and then wash with water and soap. Another method is to take a heaping table spoonful of kitchen sait, wet it with turpen-tine and acour the bathtub with it. Then rub carefully with a clean cloth. Cau-tion is needed in trying this plan, to have the tup perfectly dry before the sait and turpentine mixture is used.
