A GOOD INVESTMENT.-Wayfarers over the newly opened Madison-street bridge notice with regret that the paving blocks at the western approach are already commencing to swell and bulge, although the rainy sonson has scarcely begun. Dread is expressed that a collection of mounds similar to those at Pourth and Yambill similar to those at Fourth and Yamhill streets may result, followed by cullapse. Considerable curiosity and surprise is manifested, when the paving blocks of the eastern spans of the bridge are found to be in as good condition as when laid. The puzzle is solved when it is learned that those latter have been treated with the calcirated German wood preservative, Avenarius Carloolneum, while the former have not. This was an excellent investment, but the fact is to be deplored that the entire pavement was not safethe entire pavement was not safe-guarded. Avenarius Carbolineum is universally recognized as the only wood preservative that preserves. Its reputation has tempted unscrupulous dealers to fold spurious articles on the public under names closely resembling that of the genuine article. Those intending to use Avenurius Carbolineum should beware of these worthless counterfeits.

REPAIRS APPRICIATED.—The repairs made in the aspiralt pavement on Lower Morrison afreet recently are very much appreciated by the property-holders and residents along there. For many months holes had been worn in the asphalt at frequent intervals, so that teamsters and wheelmen were considerably acrossed. The city authorities undertook several times to fill the hales with broken rock from the adjacent quarries, but the revolving brooms would come along at night, and. not being able to discriminate between dirt that was meant for pavement and that which was not swept the holes out clean as a whistle. That pertion of Morrison street is probably one of the best-patronized thoroughfares in the city, as it is the main entrance to, as well as exit from the Morrison-street bridge.


