Slim Attendance in the Senate Yesterday—Many More Amendments Offered.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—The Senate transacted no business of importance today in open session, the entire time being spent in executive session on the Hay-Fauntleroy treaty.

Underwood demanded a separate vote on the Powers inheritance tax act, which specifically excluded the estates of persons who died prior to June 15, 1898.

Richardson (Dem. Tenn.) on behalf of the minority, then moved to recommit the bill with instructions "to forthwith report a bill reducing the revenue under a war revenue act at least the sum of \$30,000,000."
