THE DEMOCRATS DID NOT VOTE

Defeat of Smith's Express-Receipt Amendment-The Pension Appropriation Bill Was Passed in Thirteen Minutes.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 .- The House today passed the war revenue reduction bill. The opposition sought to recommit the bill with instructions to report back a measure reducing the revenue at least \$70,000,000 and including a provision for an income tax, so drawn as to occape an adverse decision of the Supreme Court. The motion failed, 131 to 155. Thereupon the bill was passed without the concurrence of the minority, who refrained from voting. The amendments placed in the bill yesterday to tax express receipts was defeated on an aye and no vote in the House, 125 to 125. The pension appropria-tion bill, carrying \$145,145,259, was passed

in exactly 12 minutes. Bobert W. Wilcox, the Delegate from Hawaii, was sworn in immediately after the approval of the journal in the House. Wilcox was escorted to the bar of the House by Peren, the Delegate from New Mexico. After the oath had been admin-istered, many members came forward to congratulate Wilcox. The consideration of the war revenue reduction bill was then

Underwood (Dem. Ala.) moved to reduce

The amount of property exempt under the inheritance tax from \$30,000 to \$5000. Payne (Rep. N. Y.) in charge of the bill, said that personally he thought the inheritance tax should not have gone in the original act, as the states generally, and especially the Eastern states, levied heavy inheritance taxes. But, if it was to remain, he was opposed to reducing the exemption to \$500. The amendment was lost, 45 to 82

Powers (Rep. Vt.) offered an amendmen providing that the inheritance tax should not be levied on the estates of persons who died prior to June 12, 1888. It was adopted, 80 to 180. Newlands (Sil, Nev.) offered a modifica-

tion of the amendment he presented yes-terday to tax industrial corporations, whose gross receipts exceed \$500,000, onewhose gross receipts exceed source, one-twentieth of one per cent upon such re-ceipts. His purpose, he said, was to reach the great aggregations of wealth. "The real purpose of this amaindment is to apply an inquisition to incorporations, is it not?" demanded Pearce (Rep. Mo.), "Its purpose," replied Newlands, "is both to raise revenue and to secure some-thing mon which to hase relative kerish.




