

RACING MEN ORGANIZE

PACIFIC NORTHWEST ASSOCIATION FORMED.

Oregon, Washington, Idaho and British Columbia Represented—Rules Laid Down.

Horsemen from various Pacific States, representing different fairs and associations met yesterday, at the office of the Rural Spirit, and organized the Pacific Northwest Racing Association, the principal business done being to lay down rules to regulate and control races, within the jurisdiction of the association, for the coming year.

Among those present were: D. A. McAllister, La Grande; D. Curry, Everett; W. H. Wehrung, Salem; M. D. Wisdom, Portland; Joseph A. Borden, Spokane; T. B. Gunn, North Yakima; W. H. Vandevanter, Seattle; W. A. Austin, Lewiston; and C. S. Loveland, Boise; W. H. Kearney, New Westminster, B. C.; J. Pearson, Victoria, B. C.; and R. Leighton, Vancouver, B. C. Mr. Wehrung was elected chairman, and Mr. Austin secretary of the meeting.

After an informal talk, it was decided that the name of the association be the Pacific Northwest Racing Association, to control and regulate races at the various fairs and race meetings throughout the circuit of the North Coast States.

These resolutions were then passed: "That any reputable fair or racing association in the States of Oregon, California, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Utah, and British Columbia, will be eligible for membership on payment of a membership fee of \$5."

"That this association adopt for the government of racing, the rules of the California Jockey Club, and that the by-laws of the National Trotting Association, amended to suit local conditions, be adopted as the by-laws of this association."

"That a board of appeals be selected, one from each state or province, who shall have the same powers and duties as are delegated to the board of appeals of the National Trotting Association."

"That all fines and penalties imposed and collected at any race meeting held by members shall be paid to this association, and reports of all such penalties be promptly sent to the secretary."

"That all jockeys must have a license from this association before being permitted to ride at any meeting held by its members, said license to be good for one year, and to cost \$5."

"That the local officers, directors or judges of the local associations have no power to remit any fine once imposed, and that the only means of removing any such disability shall be through the board of appeals, and claims and protests must be made to that body."

"That the annual meeting of the board of directors, of which the president and secretary are ex-officio members, and the board of appeals, shall be held in Portland on the second Saturday in December of each year."

These officers were then elected: President, W. H. Wehrung; vice-president, M. D. Wisdom. Board of appeals—For Oregon, D. A. McAllister; Washington, W. H. Vandevanter; Idaho, C. S. Loveland; British Columbia, R. Leighton.

The board of directors, it was decided, will be chosen later by the local associations.

Dates for the various meetings were chosen as follows for 1901, subject to modification by the local boards: Vancouver, B. C., August 31 to September 2.

Everett, September 3 to 14.
Boise, September 16 to 21.
Salem, September 23 to 28.
La Grande, October 1 to 5.
New Westminster, B. C., October 1 to 5.
Lewiston, October 7 to 12.
Victoria, B. C., October 7 to 12.
Spokane, October 14 to 19.

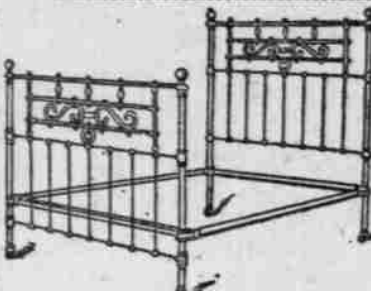

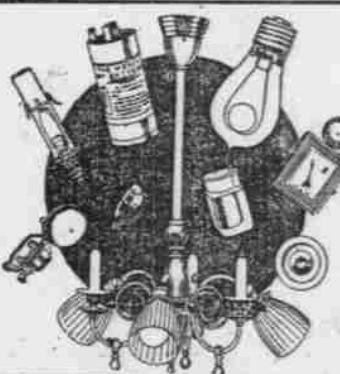

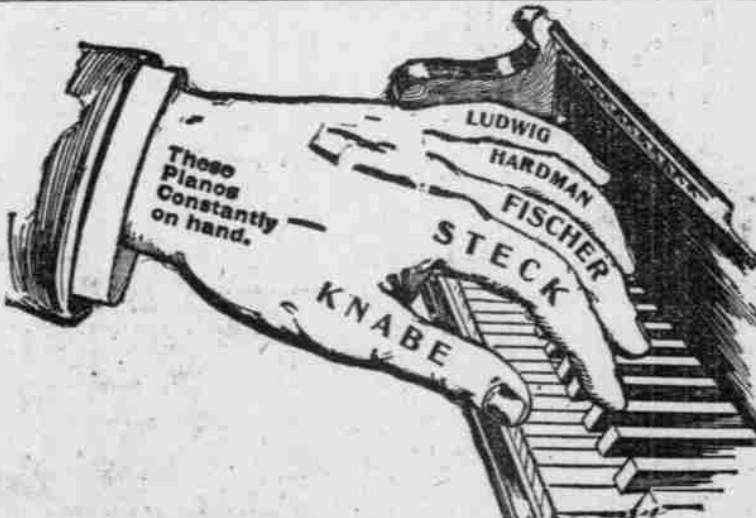
