### **NEARLY A MILLION**

Wheat Shipments From Portland the Past Week,

MADE A REMARKABLE SHOWING

Seven Sailers and One Steamship Dispatched for Foreign Ports-Record That Has Seldom Been Equaled.

Portland's wheat shipments for the week ending yesterday were over \$50,000 bushels. No other port in the United States has shipped as much wheat in a single week during the present season, and no other port or other two ports in the Pacific Northwest ever shipped so much in two weeks. Portland exceeded this record once in January, 1898, by getting out something over 1,000,000 bushels in six days, but the figures for the week just unded are believed to be the second best on record for this port for a single week. No attempt was made at recordbreaking, but the ships were just hustled along because Portland exporters had bought the wheat and chartered the ships. The same exporters are all conducting branch houses at the Puget Sound ports, but Portland is the headquarters for the Pacific Northwest, and will continue to andle the bulk of the wheat that is pro duced in Oregon, Washington and Idaho, and will supply the money for handling that which is not shipped from this port direct. The Monmouthshire carried 28,000 barrels of flour, which, reduced to wheat meas-ure, gives the amount in bushels as above. Nearly all of the firms were represented in the fleet. The Muskoka and Herzogin Sophie Charlotte were cleared by Kerr. Gifford & Co.. the Dunsyre by G. W. Mc-Near, General Millinet by A. Berg, Ar-deneralg by the Portland Grain Company, Marion Lightbody by the Portland Flour-Ing Milis Company, Langdale by Balfour, Gutnrie & Co., and the Monmouthshire by T. M. Stevens & Co. The total clearances for the first nalf of the month (flour in-cluded) have totaled over 1,800,000 bushels. and while it is hardly probable that the record will be maintained for the rest of the month, there will be upward of 1.00,-000 bushels go out between now and January 1. There are 12 large carriers in the river to load and at least a dozen others due, and out of the fleet it will not be a difficult matter to run the December shipments up pretty close to the record.

#### ANOTHER FAREWELL TRIP.

Monmouthshire on Her Last Voyage Under Present Management.

The steamship Monmouthshire was cleared yesterday for Hong Kong and way ports by T. M. Stevens & Co. She carried a cargo of 25,000 barrels of flour and a small amount of miscellaneous-cargo. The greater part of her cargo was for Hong Keng, and, in addition to the flour for that port, she carries 14 bales of cotton goods and six spars. For Manila there was a shipment of 200 cases of bak-ing powder. The Moumouthshire is mak-ing her last trin in the service of T. M. Sievens & Co. and on her arrival at Hong Kong she will be turned over to the Oregon & Oriental Steamship Com-pany, which has secured her on a time charter for 18 months. The Monmouthshire's one of the fastest and best steam-ers we have ever had on the Oriental route, and she has remained through all the vicissitudes of changing line for the last four years.

She was dispatched by Kerr, Gifford & Co., and will leave down the river Monday or Tuesday drawing 2 feet 7 inches. The Langdale, which was dispatched yesterday by Balfour, Guthrie & Co., has a smaller cargo, but draws more water. She carried III.855 bushels of wheat, and draws 22 feet 5 inches.
