Amusements.

BASEBALL—Seattle vs. Portland. Game called at 2:30. Grounds Twenty-fourth and Vaughn.

BEAR CHASE—Sunday, June 3, R. Larson will give a bear chase at his place near the Sandy bridge, on the Base Line road, about 16 miles from the city. He will have a difficult course mapped out for the hounds to follow before they overtake the bear, which will be led over the surrounding country by experienced men. Since Mr. Larson has taken up his residence at Sandy bridge he has given several bear chases, and they have all been very interesting to witness. One of the features of the coming event will be the fact that the course is to be made so as to have the dogs pass near the point from which they start, twice before the run is ended. This will give those who watch the affair a chance to see how fast the several hounds can trace the scent.

STRAWBERRY—The full season of the River strawberry is now on. The berries are well set with the berries, but they persist in being too green to pick. A number of berry-pickers were sent out to Hood River from Portland last week, but many of them have returned after waiting a day or two to see if old Sol wouldn't rush things a little. One man who has 20 acres in strawberries started in to pick, but gathered only about 20 crates a day, and this didn't justify the pickers staying around. The price paid for picking is 14 cents a box, and so slowly work is done to enable the picker to make anything.

INDIAN WAR VETERANS—T. A. Wood, grand commander Indian War Veterans, requests Indian War Veterans and friends to send the names of all comrades, their wives or widows who have died since June 1, 1890, so that a record of the same can be made at the grand encampment which meets in Portland, June 15, 1901. The grand encampment will determine on a definite course of action to enable veterans the more certainly to secure their rights.
