



The wedding of Miss Alice Harriet Heitshu, second daughter of Samuel Heitshu, and Mr. John Churchill Ainsworth, was solemnized last Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock at Trinity Church, in the presence of a congregation of friends and acquaintances that filled the sacred edifice to overflowing. The costumes of the ladies were particularly remarked for their elegance and beauty, and the gaily flowered hats which were greatly in evidence made the church look like a veritable flower garden brilliant with the buds of early spring. The only decorations were two exquisite clusters of long-stemmed La France roses placed upon the altar in tall shimmering silver vases, the effect of the scene being heightened by the lights and candles which were brightly burning about the chancel.

The decorations of the residence were simply superb, every apartment having received attention from the decorator's art.

The main drawing-room where the bride and groom received their congratulations, was all in tones of pink and white. The large bay window was filled in with a wealth of long, graceful branches of tiny white rose buds, which some pretty conceit was carried out over the paintings and surrounding the embrasures of the doorways.
