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HUNTING STRAY COINS.

A Paris Industry at Which Some 200 People Find Employment.

About two hundred men in Paris find a livelihood for hunting in the streets for stray coins. They are known as "flonneurs."

In various parts of the city strollers may often see a number of wretched looking men, dressed in rags, walking slowly in Indian file, with their eyes fixed on the ground.

M. Arrould Galopin relates that he recently followed a group of these men during a quarter of an hour.

On the Boulevard Malesherbes, they sat down on a bench, and M. Galopin entered into the following conversation with one of them:

"What are you looking for?" "The coin hunter, before replying, consulted his companions with questioning looks, and then said: "Money."

"This reply was received with incredulity, as the Paris poor often give interesting answers to questions from persons who regard them as capitalists.

"Yes, we are looking for money. On certain days we are fairly successful; on other days we are very unfortunate."

"Oh, that is nothing. We can always see them. It is a matter of habit. Once the eye is trained a man never misses a coin."

"You must not think that everybody can become a coin hunter at a day's notice. An apprenticeship is necessary."

"Why is the name 'flonneur' given to your trade?" "The name was invented by old Gantier, who, before hunting for small coins on the streets, had been a prospector in America."
