

CLATSOP BEACH.

CLATSOP BEACH, Aug. 10.—Beautiful weather prevails. The sky is spotless and bathing recently has been the best of the season. Early in the week there were some cloudy days, but the clouds and fog have cleared away. The number of campers has increased very appreciably of late, the cottages are filled, bathing is at a high tide, and the business of the hotel is good, and Seaside now presents a scene of general activity.

There is considerable going on in the amusement line, and on Sundays three church services are held, Methodist, Episcopal and Catholic. A weekly dance is given, and various private entertainments. A trip to Cannon Beach and Elk Creek by stage from Seaside is a favorite pastime. It may be made in one day, there and back, or excursionists may stay awhile at the Elk Creek House, which furnishes first-class accommodations and is doing a thriving business. Cannon Beach is one of the grandest places of the kind in the United States, and excites wonder and admiration from all beholders.

An Old Resort.
Clatsop Beach has steadily in popularity during the past forty years. About 60 cottages having been erected within the past year. As far back as 1861 Dan Lowell and a man named Kippen conducted a resort in a primitive fashion. It was built in 1871 by G. K. Grimes, who was the father of E. M. Grimes, the present proprietor of the new hotel. The old resort was opened for business in 1872, and was conducted by Mr. Grimes and his sons. The place comprised 44 acres, which was taken up as a homestead. The Seaside House, constructed by Ben Holladay, followed in 1873. This comprised the old Clatsop Summer Hotel, which was built in 1872, and a new addition. Holladay acquired the Clatsop property and also the William Latta Konraton Land Claim, the whole comprising 80 acres, and named it the Seaside farm. Mrs. Clatsop was formerly Elizabeth Latta and inherited part of the claim from her father. The place was worked with imported breeds of cattle, and in front of the hotel was a race track where Mr. Holladay sometimes exercised his horses.

In the old days the steamers from Portland ran up the Skippinon River, landing at Skippinon Landing. From there it was 12 miles starting to Seaside, and a mile or more farther to the Holladay House. Holladay ran a stage line, and the road was good time, but the road was dusty, and often when a man arrived at his destination, it was hard to tell whether he was an Indian or a white man. The road was rocky, and it is still more or less so. The Holladay House was opened by Charles Dexter.

Hauling freight and baggage was a lucrative occupation. E. M. Grimes, speaking in a reminiscent mood of the good old times, said he cleared as much as \$25 a week with one horse and one two-horse rig. They often had as many as 200 people at the hotel, and when they got there they remained, and enjoyed themselves. In 1884 the landing place of the Portland steamers was moved to the Lewis and Clark landing near Fort Clatsop, which was close to where the draw bridge crossing Young's Bay is at present located. The building of the railroad was begun in 1889, and it was completed in 1890. The railroad landing in 1890, to Flavel in 1897, and to Astoria and Portland two years ago.

Flavel has lost none of its popularity, and the guests are all having a good time. The beach adjoining the hotel is a splendid place for swimming, the water being smooth and warm. A neat bathhouse furnishes ample accommodations. A hop to be given during the week and a series of entertainments is being planned for regatta week.

Thomas Whalen purchased two cocks on a farm, and in the trap of one of them was found a small piece of coarse gold, minute particles of quartz and some black sand. Mr. Whalen is an old miner, and thinks the matter should be investigated, but he does not know where the farm is, or where he lives. He said, "there is lots of gold in that creek where that came from, and it was right from the bedrock."

Baseball is an afternoon recreation with the guests at Seaside House, who pit themselves against the small boys who are staying at the hotel. The latter are always the victors. A diminutive specimen of the latter when asked how the games come out looked surprised that there should be any question about it, and inquired, "Well, how do you think?"

He eyed the inquirer in a manner which seemed to say, "Do you really mean it?" and then proceeded to explain what long odds the boys had, as follows: "Why, only one of them can play any, and he isn't much good. Curves fix them, or slow balls every time, and they can't stop a ball any once in a while."

Blackberrying in the hills east of Seaside attracts many summer visitors, and after frequent outings of this kind the cottagers are prepared for a good supply of delicious rolls or pies. Long-needed dressing-rooms have been provided this year. Bathing costumes may be had for either sex, and distinct accommodations are provided for women. At Lockley Hall bathing suits and salt water baths may also be obtained.

Stores are numerous at Seaside, and cottagers and campers can find everything necessary to their comfort. Those who are not disposed to exert themselves in digging clams or raking in crabs can purchase an abundance of them, stands kept for that purpose at convenient places.

Fishing is Good.
Fishing in the Necanicum River continues to be a favorite sport. Trout are found in the upper waters, and later on in the year there is always a good run of salmon trout. Surf fishing is indulged in by a few. As it is necessary to wade out some distance into the water, a pair of gum boots should be worn. The line is thrown out for as possible, and in gathering it in it is convenient to do so into a small box tied in front of the waist, by dropping the fish line into the box as it is pulled in, the tangles are avoided. Flounders and porgies are also caught. Clams may be used as bait and a good catch is frequently made.

Fishing for rock cod from the rocks and strong line are used, also a float. The stickler should be about one ounce weight, tied three inches above the hook. Clams do for bait.

A. E. Gehardt, representing the Oregon Fish and Game Association, has planted 60,000 Eastern brook trout in the Necanicum River about 10 miles above Seaside. Good results are expected for the next two or three years.
