from New Orleans for California, going
via the Isthmus. He arrived in San
Francisco in 1850. He met his wife, then
Miss Caroline Aubuck, at Smora in Tuolumne County, then one of the richest
mining regions in the state. They were
married at the residence of Mr. and Mrs.
Jacob Mayer. Rabbi Meyers, of New Orleans, performed the ceremony, on August
13, 1851. Sonora was made their home,
