

EXPOSITION IS CLOSED

TWO OFFICIALS RECEIVE PRESENTS FROM EMPLOYEES.

Afternoon Was Given Over to the School Children's Drills and Interesting Field Games.

Just as the last bombs and skyrocket were being exploded on McIntown field last night a sprinkling of rain began to drive the people indoors, but the weather men held the pattering drops off until the carnival had reached a close. The crowd last night, while not the largest of the season, was of goodly proportions, and the visitors enjoyed themselves thoroughly. On the field, in addition to the fireworks, were presented the last of the series of cakewalks, Hermann's dancing down the inclined ladder, and Madame Austin and a troupe of cowboys in an exhibition of rough riding. Madame Austin rode a bucking horse, the cowboys did pick-up acts, and for a grand finale there was a race for a bride after the fashion of the plains.

In the music hall the employees of the building presented two of the officials with tokens of their esteem. D. Solis Cohen spoke in behalf of the employees in presenting E. W. Howe, superintendent, with a beautiful silver butter plate, a dozen individual dishes, and a pair of Indian blankets. General Owen Summers told Captain W. A. Hart, captain of the carnival guards, the high esteem in which he is held by the men who have been under him, and at the conclusion presented the Captain with a rocking chair. Both of the recipients made appropriate responses.

Afternoon Events.
There was a large crowd in attendance for the afternoon drill and games of the school children, and photographs were taken of the clubswinging exercises for the polytechnic moving-picture machine. The drills were presented in the afternoon, and Professor Krohn put his pupils through a series of difficult and intricate evolutions. The little ones kept together splendidly, and by far the larger part of the contestants dropped the eggs before reaching the finish-line. The winners were Estelle Frealey, Irene Collins, Florence Crow, Tillie Bunke and Xenia Holling.

Pie-Eating Contest.
The pie-eating contest was the funniest of all. When the pies were laid out on an improvised table the boys made a grand rush to get into line, and it required the combined efforts of Professor Krohn and several of the officials to keep the impatient lads in any sort of order until the contestants were assigned to their places. At the start the boys were all crammed the pastry into their mouths, and faces were bedewed with the fruit, hands were sticky, and on the stage floor there was a mass of crust and filling that could not be dropped. The first pie-winner was Harry Bennett and Webster Willcox, and the second honors went to Edward Walsendanger and Cecil Downey. The last named was a bright-looking little fellow of 8 years, and while he rapidly made the pie disappear, there was a ripple of laughter when he was asked for his name. The boy, though out of sight, was by no means on the road to the digestive organs, for before he could answer the question a big mouthful of chewed pie had to be emptied, and it was a source of much wonderment that so small a mouth could hold so much.

EAST SIDE NEWS.

Monument Association Will Be Formed—J. L. Ferguson Dying.

The association for the erection of a soldiers' monument in Lone Fir cemetery will perfect its organization the coming week. Prominent members of the several G. A. R. posts and citizens of Portland will be placed on the association, and every effort will be made to push the work. The principal office of the association will be in the building at the corner of Commercial and Main streets, and the monument will be completed and ready for dedication by next Memorial day.

The promoters start out with nearly \$100 in sight, which gives them great encouragement and the impression that the movement to put up this monument strikes a popular chord in the patriotic sentiment of the community. The fact that the promoters have made their project broad enough to take in all the soldiers, Mexican, Indian, Civil and Spanish wars, is commended. It is to be placed where many of the veterans are buried. It is quite an undertaking, but those having the matter in hand seem to think the money will be raised and the monument completed by May 20, 1902.

Cannot Recover.

J. L. Ferguson, a well-known pioneer resident, is very low at his home, 447 East Davis street, and cannot recover. Up to yesterday evening he had been in a comatose condition for 40 hours. His health has been failing for the past year, but only for about a month has he been confined to his home. He has continued to grow worse. His son, E. L. Ferguson, said last evening that the impression was still strong and he might last through the night, but might die any moment. He was wholly unconscious and was not suffering. There was nothing to do but wait for the end.

Crowded Schoolhouses.

The Clinton Kelly school, which is an 8-room building, has to provide practically for 8 rooms. The principal's office is occupied, and the hall on the second floor will also be used as a classroom. This will be done by putting in a partition, and thus providing a good classroom. This temporary arrangement will answer for a time, but before long the district will have to build a 4-room addition on the east side of the present building. The Sunnyside building is crowded and two rooms on the outside are used for a new schoolhouse, and it will probably be built next year. The board have to put forth strenuous efforts to keep up with the growth of the school population. Scarcely is one modern building finished before there is necessity for erection of another one.

Petition for Cycle Path.
A petition has been circulated asking the County Court to build a cycle path on East Stark, between East Twentieth and East Thirty-fourth streets, so there will be a continuous path from East Twentieth street to Mount Tabor. In order to reach the cycle path on the East Line road wheelmen have to use Belmont street, which is very rough. This new path is really along the county road, as East Stark street is part of the East Line road to East Twentieth street. Therefore the petition will go to the County Commissioners and the path will be easy of construction. Mount Tabor wheelmen are mainly pushing the movement for this path.

New Justice of the Peace.
C. A. Aylsworth, appointed by the Montavilla Sub-Board to ascertain what steps are necessary to secure a Justice of the Peace for Montavilla District, has reported that a petition to the County Court will be necessary, and one will be prepared and circulated as soon as practicable. It is proposed to establish a precinct east of the city and between Justice Vreeland's and the Troutdale districts. One of the objects in asking for a Justice of the Peace for Montavilla is to maintain order and repress disorder. The place has had some experience the past few months with the disorderly element, and this movement for a Justice Court is the result. Justices of the Peace outside the city are not paid salaries, but are compensated by fees.

O. R. & N. Sidetrack.
The Montavilla Sub-Board has the matter of the sidetrack from the O. R. & N. Railway well in hand. Secretary De Venny said yesterday that the subscription for a bonus, raised to purchase a strip of land from W. E. Brainerd, 100x1500, is being paid in. About \$350 was raised, mostly in small sums. It is expected that all will be paid in next week. The sidetrack will be started as soon as the deed to the land is made out.

Will Appoint Commissioners.
A congregational meeting of the Forbes Presbyterian Church, at Upper Albion, will be held this morning immediately after the regular services, for the purpose of electing commissioners to appear before the Portland Presbytery Tuesday evening. The Presbytery will consider the resignation of Rev. W. O. Forbes at that meeting, and the Commissioners will represent the congregation.

East Side Notes.
B. C. Huxson, principal of the St. Johns School, reports that the attendance has reached 95, which is in advance of last year at this time. The contractor is putting down plank on the East side of the street, so as not to interfere with travel on the street. If both sides of the street were torn up it would seriously inconvenience the public.
