DUE TO FAST HORSES.—P. J. Mann, who escaped from a highwayman on the White House road one evening last week, gives his spirited horses all the credit for it. He was driving leisurely along a short distance south of the Red House, when a tall man sprang out of the bushes, pistol in hand, shouting "Stop! Stop!" The horses were feeling good and the least loosening of the lines was instantly taken for permission to quicken their gait. The way they "got up and dusted" surprised the outlaw, who fired his revolver at the retreating driver just as the buggy was leaving him behind. Mrs. Mann did not realize that she had been the victim of an attempted hold-up, was just about dark and the highwayman's mask was barely visible.

FOR REVOLVER PLAY. \$500 BAIL.—A bit of "gun-play" appeared in evidence in a case heard yesterday before Municipal Judge Cameron when V. Hinkel was accused of assault with a deadly weapon, on the complaint of W. R. Riley. The latter testified that he worked as a carpenter for Hinkel, and that a dispute arose over a key. Both men were armed with other with blades, and finally witness and another carpenter went into a room for self-protection, and barred the door. Then Hinkel fired several shots from his revolver through the door, and afterward asked the men to come out, as he would not shoot any more. When asked what he had to say, Hinkel pleaded self-defense, but he was held in \$500 bail for the grand jury.

MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP.—On Tuesday evening next, at the Unitarian Chapel, the Portland Economic League will hold its regular meeting, when a lecture will be delivered by Mr. Thomas N. Strong, on the subject of "Municipal Ownership." Mr. Strong has spent much time in studying this important problem, and will discuss the matter with special application to American cities and to Portland in particular. The present ownership of street railways in different cities and the profits accruing from their operation will be clearly stated. Tables will also be presented to show the progress made during recent years in the municipal ownership of other public utilities. Suggestions for the future will be made by the speaker, and the subject will then be left to the members of the league for discussion. General admission, 5 cents.

BIO LUMBER CONTRACT FOR MANILA.—The Portland Lumbering & Manufacturing Company has secured a contract for supplying 2,000,000 feet of lumber to a firm about to open a yard at Manila. This order will have to be filled by November 12, and so the mills will have to rush matters for a few weeks, as the company has a good deal of other business on its hands. O. A. Ritan, manager of the company, said the success of his firm in obtaining this contract proves that Portland is the cheapest port on the coast to obtain a cargo of lumber in, as he had to bid against the world in figuring on the contract.

If the requisite amount of cash is not forthcoming from the people on the bank the dead fish are dumped into the river forthwith, which is a violation of the law, endangering the health of us who live on the banks of the river below, some of whom are compelled to use the water for household purposes. Now, whether the officials in charge are acquainted with the facts or not, they should be, and these practices brought at once to an end.
