OBEDIENT TO POPULAR JUSTICE.—State Game Warden Quimby takes exception to the brand of justice administered by a Justice of the Peace named Everett, at Hillsboro. He says it is popular justice and not justice that is dealt out in the court. The cause of the complaint is the discharge of Fred Gronert, a well-to-do farmer from the neighborhood of Scholls Ferry, who was on trial Friday for having killed a Chinese pheasant out of season and contrary to the statute which it is Mr. Quimby's particular duty to preserve from violation. He says the evidence for the prosecution was given by two reputable citizens, who were positively that they saw Gronert shoot and kill a pheasant and go and pick up the dead bird. This testimony was clear and conclusive, but the Justice refused to take it as unsatisfactory and entirely insufficient to convict. This, of course, ended the case, no defense being necessary. Mr. Quimby says that the defendant himself did not deny the charge, but would have set up as a defense the claim that he had a right to kill a bird that was injured on his own land, regardless of the law that treats birds as state property and subject to state protection. At the conclusion of the case other farmers living in Gronert's neighborhood told the warden that they did not see why they should not do as Gronert had done; that they certainly had as good a right as Gronert, and could get as much protection in the Justice Court. Mr. Quimby says, however, that he will not again attempt to prosecute any sort of case before that Justice. Hereafter, in case of violations of the law by any of the farmers of Washington County, he will wait for the Circuit Court and take the matter up in that tribunal.

WORKED THE HAT TRICK.—Burt Adams, formerly a private in the Thirty-fifth Regiment, United States Volunteers, and a veteran of the war in the Philippines, ran from a clothing store on Third street, near Burnside, last night, pursued by a yelling crowd, and was caught after a chase by Policemen Bailey and Gibson.
