STIRRED UP OVER A VOLCANO.—Jacob Garwood, a farmer of Stevenson, Wash., who was in Portland yesterday, said there was considerable excitement in his town over the appearance of a miniature volcano about a quarter of a mile back on the mountain side. Fire had been spouting from a small hole several inches in diameter for the past 10 days, and small rocks had been thrown out on the surface almost red-hot. The fire appears to burn with a steady glow, and there is no evidence of burning itself out so far. Considerable smoke, smelling strongly of sulphur, was being emitted, and at night the glow of the little volcano could be seen plainly from the residences in town. "A fire raged in the woods in that vicinity the past fall," Mr. Garwood said, "and the only theory we have is that the flames communicated to a vein of coal, which has found vent at the point indicated. A number of townspeople have banded together for the purpose of making an excavation to see where the fire comes from, and so further developments may crop out within a few days." Mr. Garwood is considered by his friends a reliable man.

MR. GARDNER'S STATEMENT.—W. C. Gardner, the Morrison-street watchmaker, charged with buying stolen property, made this statement last night: "The gun I pointed at Day after he had beaten me with a revolver was not loaded, and I took up this gun in self-defense when he threatened to kill me.
